To this end, it is worth noting that the edition is packed with other informative articles for your reading pleasure. Please, read and share with others.



-40th Cassinga Commemoration-

a Guard of Honour in respect of heroes and heroines

he 4th May is a national day in which Namibians join hands to honour and pay tribute to the victims of Cassinga Massacre of 4 May 1978 where hundreds of Namibians were brutally killed by the South African apartheid forces at the then SWAPO's Cassinga refugee camp at Huila Province in Angola. On that same day, another the then SWAPO refugee camp known as Vietnam in Cunene Province was also attacked.

This year the day was commemorated at Heroes Acre in Windhoek. A number of Namibian and Angolan nationals flocked to the Heroes Acre to pay homage to the living and fallen heroes and heroines of Cassinga.

In his keynote address, H.E. Dr. Hage Geingob, President of the Republic of Namibia highlighted the importance of commemorating the event together with the Angolan people, stating that Angola stood shoulder to shoulder with Namibia

through the darkest days of Namibia's struggle for independence. "Cassinga day reinforces the historic relations Namibia has been sharing with Angola," he emphasised.

He further stated that hundreds of defenseless sons and daughters of Namibia and Angola, mostly women and children were killed by the South African apartheid regime's instantaneous air strike which left numerous Namibians wounded and traumatised. "The sons and daughters of the Land of the Brave have traversed an arduous and torturous path towards independence," Dr. Geingob said.

At the event, President Geingob conferred Namibia's Highest Civilian Honour, the Order of the most Ancient Welwitschia Mirabilis First Class, to the Angolan President H.E. João Manuel Gonçalves Lourenço as a recognition for the significant role he played during the liberation struggle for both Namibia and Angola.



H.E. Lourenço, was on a three day state visit to Namibia and attended the 40th Cassinga day Commemoration as a guest of honour. Speaking at the event H.E. Lourenço gave credence to the long healthy bilateral relation between Namibia and Angola, and urged the two nations to comply with the contemporary demands of new development

Among his works he wrote a poem to the Cassinga massacre in 1986.

The poem read as follows

The dawn had been full of hope when from the racist regime of South Africa the cruel massacre arrived. With shrapnel and fire they sowed destruction, they shared out death to children, women, the elderly, the sick, just like



based on the close cooperation in the light of common past memories. "The joint efforts and mutual interests that we pursue will be consolidated before the history and well-being of our people," President Lourenço said.

Speaking at the same event was H.E. Giraldo Mazola, the Cuban Ambassador in Namibia, he narrated a poem by late Commander Juan Almeida, a Cuban soldier who became one of the most outstanding guerilla Commandants of the Cuban Revolution, a member of the Political Bureau of the Communist Party of Cuba and the then Vice President of Cuba.

According to the Ambassador late Commander Almeida became one of the most popular composers and made more than 300 songs and as a writer he published a dozen of books.

that, at The airplanes disgorged shrapnel vomit, and then, the mercenaries finished off whatever remained alive. It was the punishment meted out to the people because of their liberation. The calculated genocide aimed at blocking their independence and selfdetermination. They killed the shadow that lived there under

the skin waiting to return

to the beloved and defended Namibia, to recover its land, its sea, its sky or whatever remains of these after the looting and the killing.

But from the dead will spring a new life.

In a rare but powerful display of international solidarity, after the Cassinga massacre, Cuba took the majority of the children that survived the raid to undertake their studies in the Island of Youth. Over 600 Namibian children arrived in Cuba by late 1978.

Amongst the common military functions executed during the event was the performance of Reveille and Last Post Bugle, which is a musical sound that depicts the act of incite and remembrance of the fallen heroes and heroines. The event concluded by the two Heads of State and the Cuban Ambassador laying wreaths at the eternal flame in memory of heroes and heroines of Cassinga.

Last Post and Reveille

Colonel Mukwanangobe Auguste ate Mwalimushi ya Immanuel commonly known as 'Mukwahepo' was accorded a dignified farewell compounded of the 17 Gun Salute, National Salute, and the Last Post and Reveille as recognition for her unfaltering role in the liberation struggle.

Col Immanuel passed away on 30 May 2018 at the age of 80. She was laid to rest at the Eenhana Shrine on 09 June where she was conferred a military funeral as an honour for her contribution to the liberation struggle. She was the first Namibian

woman to receive military training in 1964 as a combatant of South West Africa Libration Army (SWALA) at Kongwa Training Centre in Tanzania. She was the only female PLAN combatant to be conferred with the honorary rank of Colonel in 2007 by H.E. Dr. Hifikepunye Pohamba, former President of the Republic of Namibia. She was also conferred with Omugulugwombashe medal in 1995 by H.E. Dr. Sam Nujoma, Founding President of Namibia at Omugulugwombashe in recognition of her heroism and contribution to the liberation of

Namibia.

To a greater extent, the honour bestowed on her name also stems from being the 3rd Namibian woman to go in exile, evading colonial oppression in her quest to liberate the motherland from the South African apartheid regime. Evidently, the military honour signified her role as a mother figure which she extended to many in exile.

The NDF officers led the procession as Bearers



he School of Military Science at UNAM hosted a reception in honour of its Alumni and pioneers for the Bachelor of Science in Military Science Degree on 19 April 2018 at Windhoek Main Campus.

Twenty three graduates from the Ministry of Defence were the first cohorts to graduate with Bachelor of Science (Honours) Degree in Military Science (B.Sc. Military Science) majoring in Aeronautical, Army, Nautical Weapons, Nautical Electronics as well as Nautical Mechanics. The B.Sc. Military Science graduates were part of the UNAM students who graduated in different fields in April 2018 at Safari Hotel, Windhoek.

Apart from 23 members who graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Military Science (Honours) Degree, the reception was also attended by 09 members who graduated with Postgraduate Diploma and 07 others with a Master Degree in Security and Strategic Studies.

In the speech read on his behalf, the Chief of the Namibian Defence Force (CDF), Lt Gen John Mutwa applauded the graduates for hard work that led them to successfully complete their studies. He stated that, he was aware that the journey towards obtaining their qualifications was not easy and it was through perseverance and hard work that they obtained their qualifications.

He encouraged the graduates to continue with their studies in order to upgrade their qualifications. The CDF reminded the graduates that his office is always ready to assist them in case they want to further their studies in areas that are relevant to the MOD and NDF mission. "Do not give up and I would say that 'the sky must be the limit'. We need Doctors and Professors in various fields of study. My office has been supportive all along towards your studies and it remains ready to assist you", he said.

The B.Sc. Military Science programme was fully funded by the government through the MOD. In this regard the CDF therefore urged the graduates to

apply the knowledge they gained from their studies to plough back to the defence of their motherland.

Professor Kenneth Matengu, UNAM Vice Chancellor for Research, Innovation and Development expressed his sincere appreciation for the cooperation between UNAM and MOD. He highlighted that the cooperation started a long way when the school only had a Postgraduate Diploma and Master Programme in Security and Strategic Studies. The relation gradually grew and introduced a Bachelor of Science (Honours) Degree in Military Science. "The school did not only intend to develop capacity into the NDF Arms of Service, but also to ensure that the programme goes beyond the defence. The school would also like to develop a programme that speaks to the comprehensive aspects of security and strategic activities of the government," Prof. Matengu said.

He further stated that the school also signed cooperation with several academic institutions such as the University of Nairobi which has a big faculty of military in Africa and University of Stellenbosch where some of its academic staff members are serving in the School of Military Science. In light of the above, the Professor said that through this cooperation, the school will be able to explore and consolidate in military and security aspects.

"We believe in power of partnership and utilising Africa's capacity as we move on and go forward," he stressed.

Lastly, Prof. Matengu informed the Defence Management that the need for modernising armed forces is strongly recommended and urgent.

In this sense, he stated that the school will play its part and work together with the MOD to ensure that they tackle the security challenges including cyber security amongst others. "I know that some military aspects require certain sensitivity and we would not use it without proper consultations," he concluded.




In his official opening speech, Hon. Billy Mwaningange, the Deputy Minister of Defence expressed his appreciation to the British Council for initiating the programme at the time when





A BOOK, 'THE WAR BETWEEN MY LIFE AND

DEATH' LAUNCHED

arrant Officer 2 (WO2) Simeon Simon Valimo Kandjala lauched a book titled 'War Between My Life and Death'. The book reflects memories and accounts of his life of battling with psoriasis was launched on 28 April 2018 at Hossian Parish in Windhoek.

WO2 Kandjala has been battling with psoriasis, ever since he joined the liberation struggle in the 1980's. Psoriasis is an unpredictable and irritating skin condition, which is a result of skin cells multiplying faster causing underlying cells to reach the surface and die. WO2 Kandjala has been secretly suffering from the disease but could not tell his compatriots about his condition fearing that they might think he was afraid to go to battlefield.

Even though the MOD assisted WO2 Kandjala in 2008 to seek medical treatment in Cuba, he still battling with ailment as it is incurable. He depends on a regular injection which he takes every two or three months at the cost of N\$ 14 000, which has improved his health condition.

In a statement read on his behalf at the book launch, Lieutenant General (Rtd) Epaphras Denga Ndaitwah said that it was not easy to talk about someone's health condition in public, but due to

Kandjala's courage, "we are here today talking about psoriasis that he has been battling for years," he added.

He pointed out some qualities attributed to WO2 Kandjala that include courage, determination and faith which kept him strong to endure the long suffering from psoriasis. General

Ndaitwah also acknowledged the financial support from the MOD and the loving support of his family that ultimately kept his life going.

Furthermore, he stated that the book summarises everything that happened to Kandjala, the difficulties he went through and his experience with depression. "I therefore urge you all to buy the book and read it in order to get a

better understanding why his book is titled 'The War between my Life and Death.'" he emphasised.

At the same occasion Brigadier General Erastus Nomongula Kashopola reflected WO2 Kandjala's contribution towards the liberation struggle as a young PLAN fighter, tough, energetic, intelligent and ever vigilant warrior from the Alpha Detachment as a reconnaissance cadre. "The same eagerness and determination he demonstrated during the liberation struggle is reflected in his firm fight against psoriasis," said Gen Kashopola.

WO2 Kandjala was born on 02 March 1967 at Onheleiwa, Omusati Region. He holds a diploma from United Lutheran Theological Seminary Paulinum and a certificate in Christian Ministry from the Namibia Evangelical Theological Seminary. He is the current Chaplain at Lt Gen Dimo Hamaambo Garrison.

The ability of cyber attackers to reach the desired targets without need for mass deployment of troops

represents a new dimension of advanced warfare that is capable of compromising the national security of any idling nation. Therefore, there is a vested interest for any government to work closely with their security agencies to develop comprehensive cyber security measures to mitigate the impact of cyber attack as well as deter their intended actions.

In the past months, newspapers have published articles concerning cyber security in Namibia and other African countries. The notion they depicted is that while other countries are actually strengthening their security agencies, the resources availed to these agencies in developing countries remain inadequate. In of cyber security challenges.

Although advanced technology compromises the country's security and information, it is also vital to secure a country's cyber space by making use of advanced technology and having people with the right knowledge and expertise to counter any cyber security threats arising from new technology.

However, Research Associate for the Institute for Public Policy Research, Fredrico Links argued in the Informante article dated 08 February 2018 that the government should be aware that cyber security problems will not be solved by technology alone, but also requires a multi-stakeholder approach. He said that the matter requires a close cooperation and coordination by all internet stakeholders, including businesses, organisational and individual users, governments and law enforcement agencies, and policy makers worldwide.

Local Political Commentator, Ndumba Kamwanyah maintained in Namibian Sun publication dated 31 January 2018 that governments should avoid putting foreign entities in charge of the construction and security system of buildings. He warned that foreign entities might have their own interests, they come for their economic and political interests and hence entrusting them with the country's security is a concern and the nation should be cautious.

Therefore, it is advisable for any government or security agency to create an enabling environment for employees and politicians alike to understand the impact of cyber threats.

In light of the above, employees and individuals may consider applying the following measures to protect themselves from cyber-attack:

- Do not post your address, phone number or other personal information on the internet.
- Try to keep what you post online limited to the people that you trust.
- Protect your computer by updating your anti-virus and anti-spyware software and also be sure to purchase these tools from trusted retailers or suppliers.
- Beware of criminals posing as financial institutions, bill-paying services or government agencies who will often send emails asking you to authorize transactions or verify information online. For example, the fake facebook account of Hon. Netumbo Nandi-Ndaitwah, Deputy Prime Minister of the Republic of Namibia that was created claiming to reward individuals with scholarships by having to make an advanced payment.
- Be very selective about opening attachments in emails. Even emails from a trusted source can be dangerous when a friend or colleague's email is hacked.
- Change your passwords often. Most security experts recommend that you change your passwords at least once every three months.
- Use a unique password for each site. Be sure your passwords include a mix of upper and lowercase letters, numbers, and symbols for maximum security. For example, a Y729 familiar! @.

Take advantage of mobile banking applications.
 You can bank safely with mobile apps that provide secure access to your accounts. For example, Nedbank app.

It would also be advisable that security agencies invest in human capital by collaborating with trusted leading institutions that specialise in cyber security related fields to develop courses to train cadres of cyber security experts who will tackle the increasing cyber threat landscape.

Industrial experts can collaborate and craft policies to govern cyber security through standardising operating procedures in cyberspace to better protect classified networks.

However, keeping in mind that cyberspace is a network of networks that includes countless computers across the globe, no state or organisation can unilaterally maintain effective cyber security. Hence, government should continue to explore possible ways to defend its networks from malicious threats, and invest in people and technology.

He encouraged men and women in uniform to participate in various sport codes in order to maintain their physical fitness and bring more medals in the NDF.

GUNNERS SCOOP N\$300 000 IN THE LEAGUE CAMPAIGN

he NDF's Mighty Gunners soccer team collected Three hundred thousand (N\$ 300 000) prize money after they finished third in the 2017/2018 Namibia Premier League campaign for the first time since they were promoted again to the national top flight in 2014 from the National Far-Northern First Division.

Ever since they joined the league three seasons ago, Mighty Gunners Football Club from Jonas Shoongeleni Ndeimana Barracks in Otjozondjupa Region found it demanding to occupy the top three positions in the log-standing in the elite league dominated by tenacious clubs in the country. The men in gold and black outfit are now a force to reckon with after they completed the league at a position traditionally occupied by certain Windhoek based teams such as Tigers, Black Africa, African Stars, Orlando Pirates and the likes of Blue Waters and Eleven Arrows from the Walvis Bay.

In fact, the Gunners started the 2017/2018 sluggishly with two losses in a row but bounced back mid-season to secure their place in the top five towards the end of the league season. The mid-season's rise progress vitalised the confidence and inspired the NDF team to a third position, and probably to put up a fight when the league program for 2018/19 starts, come September 2018.





In all 30 mandatory matches for 2017/18 top-flight campaign, the Mighty Gunners route out to 17 wins, l0 losses and 3 draws on 58 points. The win included the last two away matches they won 3-0 against Black Africa and 1-0 over Young Africa. For their efforts, the Gunners finished 3rd and banked N\$ 300 000 cash prize which is an incentive to walk with their heads high and anticipate a more advanced top position in the 2018/2019 league campaign.

Otjiwarongo was in a cheery mood as the Mighty Gunners entered the town on 07

June from a success the weekend they were pronounced third place winners. Players and supporters pervaded the streets to celebrate the achievements and invite the community to join them and support the Gunners in the 2018/19 season as they set to continue from where they left off.
