





Such Exercises impart on participants a thorough understanding of the challenges involved in joint planning and coordinating complex national and multinational peace support operations.

The exercises thus test communication, decision making in the complex situation of uncertainty, and the effectiveness of joint planning. They enhance the overall conflict management capacity of the troops involved and forge professional links among themselves. They further enhance capabilities of involved military officers and improve understanding of their roles and that of their civilian counterparts in peace support efforts.

Although Joint Military Exercises are costly, they are classified especially by Southern African Development Community (SADC) and African Union (AU) as activities that worth undertaking in the promotion of Regional and Global peace. To date, Namibia as a member state of SADC prides herself for successfully hosting bilateral and multilateral Exercises such as; Exercise Welwitchia in 2013, Exercise Hangannee I in 2016, Exercise Blue Kunene in 2017, and has undertook to host Exercise Hanganee II in 2020.

To this end, the Namibian Defence Force values the efforts of Joint Military Exercises, as they enhance military personnel's performance in conflict resolution efforts.

Honours and Awards celebrating extraordinary rich and generous services

he Namibian Defence Force (NDF) has acknowledged the value and military traditions by honouring and conferring medals to Army members who have served and performed exceptionally during their military career.

Since the establishment of the NDF, members have been actively involved in maintaining peace and security in the country and also contributed to international stability.

Over three thousand (3000) soldiers were conferred with various medals including NDF Commendation, Army Pioneers, Army 10 Years, Army 20 Years and Operation Mandume for outstanding service to the country.

The medals were conferred in descending order of seniority whereby Hon. Penda Ya Ndakolo, Minister of Defence conferred medals to Lt Gen

John Mutwa, Chief of the Defence Force (CDF) and Rear Admiral Peter Vilho, Permanent Secretary (PS) of the Ministry of Defence on 04 September at Defence Headquarters.

Hon. Ya Ndakolo commended both PS and CDF for ensuring that the Defence Force is well equipped, trained, disciplined and combat ready at all times. "Under your care, the NDF successfully carried out various military assignments both at home and abroad despite some challenges and these would not be possible without your commitment and dedication to the mission as enshrined in the Namibian Constitution," Minister stated.

On the same day, Lt Gen Mutwa conferred medals on General and Senior Officers at a colourful parade mounted at Tobias Hainyeko Garrison while

officers from Lieutenant Colonel and below received medals from their commanders at their respective duty stations.

Addressing the parade, Lt Gen Mutwa felt honoured to award medals which he said is a military tradition that came a long way and it inspires soldiers.

He further stated that serving for more than a decade was a noble journey that contributed towards training and development of the NDF, adding that their service did not only contribute to peace and security in the country but it went beyond the breadth and width of Africa and the world at large.

"We should not forget that the Army Pioneers constituted the first Namibian Peacekeeping contingent to Cambodia in 1992 as part of our contribution to the maintenance of international peace and security. Similarly, I further acknowledge the contribution made by all members of the NDF who participated in the United Nations Peace Missions notably, in Angola, Ivory Coast, Liberia, Ethiopia and Eritrea amongst others," Gen stated

The CDF also acknowledged the gallant warriors who participated in Operation Mandume and Operation Atlantic from 1999-2002 at North-eastern

Namibia, Southern Angola, and the Democratic Republic of Congo respectively.

"I hold a conviction that for those Operations to become a success, it was because of unwavering dedication, persistent sacrifice, bravery and determination that you have demonstrated," concluded the General.

It honours members of the NDF who have displayed commendable performance in line with military traditions during their service and reflects credit upon themselves, their Directorates, Formations, Units and the NDF as a whole.

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ARMY TWENTY YEARS

This medal is awarded in recognition for the meritorious achievement during the two decades of uninterrupted service in the Namibian Army.





embers of the Namibian Defence Force (NDF) from all Arms of Service constituted a Brigade that mounted a parade to perform ceremonial functions in honour of the 28th Heroes' Day Commemoration at Nkurenkuru the capital town of Kavango West Region.

The crowd at Nkurenkuru Stadium was placed in a delighted mood as the colourful brigade in route columns of battalions marched into the parade under the command of Col Paulus Shetwaadha lpinge, the Parade Commander and Commander of Reconnaissance Regiment, before the arrival of H.E. Dr. Hage Geingob, President of the Republic of Namibia



and Commander-In-Chief of the Namibian Defence Force.

The day was dawned with the National and AU Anthems by the NDF brass band, 21-Gun salutes in remembrance of heroes and heroines who launched the liberation struggle of Namibia as well as those who contributed to the cause of independence. As a tradition at national events, men and women in uniform displayed their drill skills to showcase military culture and discipline.

After the parade inspection followed by parade march off, and fly-pass by military air assets conducted concurrently with weapon display as a demonstration of combat readiness, Dr. Geingob addressed the nation and informed them the significance of the day which was commemorated under the theme "Working for A United, Free and Just Namibia."

H.E. stated that Heroes and Heroines who were honoured came from all walks of life and from all regions of the motherland. "They all shared one great character, a strong desire to transform their feelings or compassion for their fellow countrymen and women into heroic action," said Dr. Geingob.

The President made a clarion call to all Namibians that as they commemorate and reflect on Heroes day, they should also remain committed to the dream of creating a peace loving, united and prosperous country. "We should look forward, towards the path of peace, healing and national reconciliation. Let us hold hands in the spirit of Unity, Liberty and Justice for the sake of a better Namibia. The land we all call home, the Land of the Brave sons and daughters whose blood waters our freedom. We should not lose sight of the reasons for which so many Namibians sacrificed their lives. It was about Unity, Liberty and Justice," said the President.

26 August 'Heroes Day' reflect the day when gallant sons and daughters of the Namibian soil launched the liberation struggle at Omugulugwombashe in

1966 against the South African apartheid regime. During that time, the then South Africa government was mandated by the League of Nations to prepare South West Africa now Namibia towards its selfdetermination.

However, South African apartheid regime refused to allow self-determination for South West Africa, which forced the UN to revoke their mandate in 1966. South African apartheid regime refused to recognise that move and invaded all resistance from Namibian liberation fighters. On 26 August 1966, the People's Liberation Army of Namibia clashed with soldiers of the South African apartheid regime at Omugulugwombashe, marking the launch of Namibia's liberation struggle, which they eventually won in 1989.

VALIDATES A DRAFT FOR NATIONAL ACTION PLAN ON WOMEN, PEACE AND SECURITY

amibia made a significant progress on its journey to realise the implementation of the United Nations Security Council Resolution (UNSCR) I 325 which seek to promote and recognise the crucial roles women play in the prevention and management of conflicts as well as their roles in post-conflict peace building.

This significant inroad was given prominence when the Ministry of Defence, Ministry of Gender Equality and Child Welfare and other stakeholders convened a meeting to review and validate the draft for the National Action Plan (NAP) on Women, Peace and Security held on 07 July 2018 in Windhoek.

The United Nations Security Council Resolution (UNSCR) 1325 was adopted in 2000 to compel UN member states to comply with the objectives of the Resolution in order to promote and strengthen women's influence and meaningful participation during peace processes and to empower them through education and continuous capacity building.

Namibia's NAP focuses on five pillars namely;

- I. Participation of women in political and security decision making processes and structures.
- 2. Prevention of conflict and all forms of violence and against women and girls.
- 3. Prevention of impunity for sexual and gender based violence.
- 4. Protection of women and children in conflict and non-conflict situations.
- 5. Promotion of women's participation in relief and recovery efforts.

The meeting attracted local and regional feminists and security experts who highlighted and reaffirmed the importance of NAP and the need for translating it into a working document.

Speaking at the occasion, Hon. Penda Ya

Ndakolo, Minister of Defence singled out that NAP is an instrument, which does not only define the priorities, but also guides the implementation and facilitates the monitoring and reporting on

the Women, Peace and Security agenda at national level.

Conversely, Ya Ndakolo explained that equal participation of men and women in UN Peacekeeping missions fulfil the national development instruments such as Harambee Prosperity Plan (HPP) and National Development Plans (NDPs), that stipulate inclusivity of all people. "We are convinced that equal participation and opportunities for men and women in peace processes and development efforts will galvanise governments and citizens into action that brings about more gender sensitive security sectors," stated the Minister.

Meanwhile, Ms. Jebbeh Foster, the Regional Advisor on Women, Peace and Security, Eastern and Southern Africa Regional Office commended Namibia for fulfilling the UNSC Resolution 1325 and urged for the acceleration of NAP's endorsement process. "More importantly, it is not

about reporting but fulfilling the aspirations of the NAP; of maintaining a safe and peaceful Namibia where all women, men, girls and boys have equal rights and live with dignity without fear. We thank the Government of the Republic of Namibia for trusting the UN, especially UN Women to accompany them on this journey towards the development of a NAP on Women, Peace and

ne of the well decorated NDF soldiers, the first Commander of Namibia Special Forces and battle tested cadre Maj Gen Ben Uuyumba Kadhila remarkably completed his military career after serving the NDF since its inception in 1990.

Maj Gen Kadhila, the former Chief of Staff Joint Operations bids farewell to the Ministry of Defence and the Namibian Defence Force at a reception held in his honour in July at the Defence Headquarters.

Gen Kadhila's military career dates back during the liberation struggle where he served as a combatant of the People's Liberation Army of Namibia. 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Botswana, Namibia Joint Military Exercise

Inspires cordiality and harmonises military ethics and skills so that the two countries unhesitatingly work together in,SADC, AU and UN Peacekeeping Missions under the banner of SADC Standby Force

amibia and Botswana conducted a joint military exercise code named Exercise TSHWARAGANO II to test and enhance interoperability between the Namibian Defence Force (NDF) and Botswana Defence Force (BDF). Exercise Tshwaragano II was conducted from 16 - 30 July 2018 in the general area of Hunkutsi, Lehututu, Kang, and Phuduhudu in the Republic of Botswana.

Exercise TSHWARAGANO II is a reciprocal to EX-HANGANEE I held in Namibia in 2016, designed to improve the joint training exercises between the two Forces in a multi-dimensional Peace Support Operation context at country level and in line with the Southern African Development Community Standby Forces (SADCSF) concept within the broader Southern African Development Community (SADC) Peace and Security spectrum.

In addition, the exercise design was based on Peace Support Operation (PSO) aimed at providing a climax to training and capacity building in order to evaluate the effectiveness of SADCSF in any given Peace Support Operation mandated by African Union (AU) and United Nations (UN).

The overall objectives of the exercise were to enhance interoperability between the two forces so as to practice the employment of a robust rapid deployment capability of the SADCSF at any initial phase of the mission. Additionally, the exercise aimed at jointly training the two Forces on tactics, techniques, procedures and processes used in PSO as well as to practice the planning and conduct of a Joint Peace Support field training exercise at operational and tactical levels.

FOURTEEN SOLDIERS GRADUATE FROM MILITARY SCHOOL'S AUTOMOTIVE PROGRAM

elected members of the NDF have graduated from automotive mechanical program tailored to up-skill them in the areas that would enable them to keep the Defence vehicle fleet operational at all time.

Fourteen students received Automotive Mechanics Level III Certificates at the Military School (MS) on 19 September 2018 in Okahandja after spending a rewarding three (3) years figuring out key components in the areas of automotive maintenance and repair:

The Automotive Mechanic Course is one of the programs offered by MS and is accredited by Namibia Qualification Authority (NQA).

It is registered with the Namibia Training Authority in terms of Regulation 19 of the Regulations for Registration of Vocational Education and Training Providers.

The course runs for three years in phases (level I to III) and students are placed on job attachment to various recognised private motor companies for practical skills and to gain extra experience.

Hon. Penda Ya Ndakolo, the Minister of Defence, H.E. Christian Schlaga, German Ambassador to Namibia, Brig Gen Eusebius Kashindi, Commandant of the MS as well as other stakeholders were at the graduation ceremony to witness the closure of the very important highlight in the development of the NDF.

Speaking at the event, Minister Ya Ndakolo revealed that the graduation was an evidence that the MS is making significant headway and transforming itself into a sustainable training institution, thus urging the Defence Force management to

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Delivering the official opening speech for Exercise TSHWARAGANO II on behalf of the Commander BDF, Major General MCO Mophuting, Director General Support Services of BDF stated that, the successful execution of Exercise Tshwaragano I in Botswana in 2014 and Exercise Hanganee I in Namibia in 2016 was a clear indication that the two countries are dedicated, committed, prepared and determined to continuously train together in bi-lateral joint Peacekeeping operations. "I am equally convinced that the programme areas contained in the exercise concept have cemented a cordial relationship between Botswana and Namibia," Gen Mophuting concluded.

During the exercise, the Forces conducted the outreach programs such as primary health care, dental services, health education, and voluntary HIV counselling and testing among the community members of Kang and the surrounding villages. Furthermore, the Forces also carried out renovations and other services to the existing structures of selected school in Kang, Phuduhudu and Lehututu areas.

The joint training exercises are part of the continued implementation of resolutions taken during the 22nd Session of Botswana /Namibia Joint Permanent Commission on Defence and Security (JPCDS) held in Botswana, 2012 and the Roadmap III for the Operationalisation of the African Standby Force of November 2011.

The next Joint Exercise code named Ex Hanganee II will be conducted in Namibia in 2020.

position the graduates at suitable line of work in order to use and transfer their knowledge and experience for the benefit of the NDF.

To the graduates, Minister urged them to use the opportunity to explore the automotive mechanical field and also to advance their knowledge and skills through various accredited institutions.

"You are lucky to get the opportunity to go through a good study programme accredited with the NQA," said Ya Ndakolo, adding that they should apply the skills and knowledge they have obtained to help the Defence Force to maintain its vehicle fleets in good condition and to be ready for combat.

The Automotive Mechanical Program offered in the MS is a brainchild of the German Advisory Group Namibia, which is responsible for the implementation of projects and tactical goals in the area of defence cooperation. "I recognised the significant contribution made by the German Advisory Group Namibia in all aspects pertaining to the course from the initial planning to its accreditation phase, Minister acknowledged.

Meanwhile, H.E Schlaga, thanked the graduates for their commitment and urged them to make use of their knowledge acquired. "I am asking you to never forget what you study. You are part and parcel of a bigger unit with much more important complex unit," Schlaga concluded.

21st Session of Namibia, Zambia JPCDS

he Governments of the Republic of Namibia and Zambia have a strong bilateral tie particularly in the area of Defence and Security, and they meet annually to review their cooperation through the Joint Permanent Commission on Defence and Security (JPCDS).

The JPCDS is a platform that brings together Defence and Security experts of the two sister countries to discuss issues related to defence, peace, and security amongst others.

In their quest to further strengthen the existing Defence and Security relations, Namibia hosted the 21st Session of the Namibia/Zambia JPCDS in Windhoek from 24 – 28 September.

During their deliberations, the Commission reviewed the implementation of the resolutions of the 20th Session of the JPCDS, held in September 2017 in Zambia, and noted with satisfaction the progress made in their execution.

The Commission assessed the political and security

developments in Namibia and Zambia that had taken place since the last Session and noted. with satisfaction, that the situation in both countries had remained peaceful and Nonetheless, it observed that transnational crimes such as illegal possession of fire arms, migration, smuggling of goods as well as human and drug trafficking had continued to pose a threat to the two countries. SUICIDE AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

n an effort to create suicide awareness and prevention among soldiers, the MOD organised a week long campaign (07 – 15 August) aimed at educating NDF members on how to deal with situations and acts that leads to suicide.

Suicide Prevention is an international day commemorated annually on 10 September to provide worldwide commitment and action to prevent suicide.

However, the MOD came up with the long week campaign to reach and spread messages to members of the NDF under the theme 'Working Together to Prevent Suicide.' The campaign helps people to have a better understanding of what suicide is and how it can be prevented. It reduces the stigma associated with the condition and lead to more people seeking help.

According to World Health Organisation, close to one million people died every year across the globe due to suicide, therefore the premise of MOD was to outline, educate and instil hope on members confronted with various social challenges that might force them to commit suicide.

Speaking to members from units in the vicinity of Windhoek at the closure of the campaign on 15 August at Hanganee Katjipuka Kavezeri Barracks, Brig Gen. Dr. Sophia Ndeitunga, Chief of Staff Defence Health Services said that the task in terms of providing and

educating members with psychological problems is enormous. "The MOD will simply not achieve this alone, hence joint efforts of stakeholders with the expertise is indispensable," said Gen Ndeitunga.

In terms of establishing appropriate suicide prevention mechanism, Gen Ndeitunga pointed out early identification and effective management as keys on ensuring that people receive the needed care and support. "I urge Commanders to play a very important and critical role on suicide prevention by providing social support to vulnerable individuals, fighting stigma and engage on follow-up care," stressed Dr. Ndeitunga.

Chief of Staff Defence Health Services revealed that at least 80 percent of suicides committed in Namibia are the consequences of depression, chronic illness, financial problems, family problems and unrealistic expectations, adding that hanging, shooting, drowning, gassing, poisoning one selves and throat slighting are the common methods used by suicide victims. "Talk to someone you trust or seek professional help from Psychologists, Social Workers, Chaplains or Pastors in order to reduce the alarming rate of suicide in Namibia," General Ndeitunga concluded.

undertook to re-affirm and secure the common borders by 2020. In the same vein, it urged the law enforcement institutions of both countries to enhance the fight against cross border crimes and to accordingly address migration, refugees, and customs issues.

It expressed concern over the increasing cases of wildlife crimes in both countries and underscored the need for Defence and Security institutions of the two countries to remain vigilant and intensify their joint operations as well as exchange of information on poaching syndicates.

Concerning the secessionist activities in the two countries, the Commission noted that activists had continued with their calls for secession.

As a result, the Commission stressed the need for the Defence and Security institutions to continue monitoring the activities of secessionists in both Namibia and Zambia, because if not addressed, it has the potential to undermine the security of the two countries.

The Commission also recognised the growing threat of terrorism, which has the potential to undermine the security of the two countries and the region. Thus, the Commission implored the Defence and Security institutions of the two countries to not only maintain security along the common borders, but also intensify joint operations and the exchange of information in order to curb such vices.

Moreover, the Commission noted the ongoing land issues in Namibia as well as in some SADC member states. Therefore, it congratulated the Namibian Government on her commitment to address the matter during the Second National Land Conference.

Concerning the regional security, the Commission discussed political developments in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) ahead of its national elections. The Commission thus expressed hope that stakeholders to the electoral process in the DRC would continue to engage and agree on various modalities that would ensure a credible and peaceful conduct of the polls.

In addition, it commended the people of Zimbabwe for the peaceful and credible manner in which they conducted the elections in July 2018. In this regard, the Commission congratulated His Excellency Emmerson Mnangagwa for winning the elections.

It also expressed satisfaction with the efforts of the SADC towards the reform process for the return to constitutional order in the Kingdom of Lesotho. It therefore, congratulated the Member States deployed in that country under the SADC Preventive Mission in Lesotho (SAPMIL) for restoring peace and order.

Finally, the Commission reviewed the situation prevailing in the Republic of Madagascar and urged the Government and people of that country to work towards peace and stability.

Hon. Penda Ya Ndakolo, Minister of Defence, led the Namibian delegation while Hon. Davies CHAMA, Minister of Defence led the Zambian delegation.
